## Help Prevent Home Fire Deaths and Injuries

This year's Orange County Heroes Awards will benefit the Red Cross Home Fire Campaign.

Most of us don't realize we have just two minutes to escape a home fire — which is the nation's most frequent disaster. That's why the American Red Cross is preparing families to act quickly through our Home Fire Campaign.

Every second counts when there's a home fire. Home fires claim seven lives every day but having working smoke alarms can cut the risk of death by half. The Red Cross Home Fire Campaign helps save lives by installing free smoke alarms in homes that don't have them, and by educating people about home fire safety.

Through Sound the Alarm events, which are part of the Home Fire Campaign, the local Red Cross partners with fire departments and community partners to install free smoke alarms and provide Orange County residents with important fire safety education. Together, we meet with local families to install free smoke alarms, help them create a two-minute fire escape plan and share safety information on home fires and other local disaster risks.

Since the program launch in 2014, we have installed more than 21,700 free smoke alarms and made over 7,900 homes safer in Orange County.

Nationwide, over 2.6 million free smoke alarms have been installed and 2,102 lives have been saved thanks to smoke alarms installed by the Red Cross and partners through the Home Fire Campaign.

Master of Ceremonies

Chip Yost started as a reporter with KTLA in 2007 and has since covered some of the biggest news events of our time. He was at the Vatican when Pope Francis was elected. He was at the 2016 Republican and Democratic National Conventions. He has reported live from hurricane zones in Florida, Texas and Hawaii, and from

mass shooting scenes in Uvalde, Parkland, Dallas, Orlando and San Bernardino.

Chip also serves as KTLA's Orange County Bureau Chief, where he has covered wildfires, mudslides and the "snitch scandal" that derailed the prosecution of the man responsible for the worst mass shooting in county history.

Before joining KTLA, Chip worked as an investigative reporter at KUSA in Denver and a general assignment reporter at KOLD in Tucson, KYMA in Yuma, and KGET in San Diego. Chip's reporting has earned him numerous awards, including the duPont Silver Baton, Emmy and Golden Mike.

Chip received his master's degree from the Colombia University Graduate School of Journalism in New York and his bachelor's degree from the University of Cincinnati College of Business, where he majored in marketing and real estate.

#### Equine Herd at The Shea Center Animal Welfare Hero

Established in 1978, The Shea Center is dedicated to improving the lives of people with disabilities through therapeutic horse-related programs. The Shea Center provides equine-assisted services and therapeutic equestrian programs and therapies such as physical,

accident and burn victims, heart surgery and organ transplant patients, and those battling cancer.



#### Dan Lam Disaster Services Hero

Westminster resident Dan Lam has a powerful story of escaping his native Vietnam to Thailand many years ago. During his dangerous months-long journey, Dan found refuge at a Red Cross refugee camp for nearly a year. After making it to the United States, he later

married a woman he met at the Red Cross camp years earlier and raised a family in Westminster, Calif. Now, he's giving back to the Red Cross as a volunteer with the Red Cross of Orange County. Dan has been a dedicated Disaster Services volunteer since 2008. In 2023, Dan responded to 57 local disasters - often home fires during late night and early morning hours - to provide comfort and care to those affected. Dan has also deployed for three weeks to help people affected by storms in Guam. When asked why he volunteers, Dan responds: "People deserve our help and I'm paying it forward."

#### Derrick Ankerstar, Kevin Estrada, and Megan Matchett, Orange County Parks First Responder Heroes

On Sunday, April 2, 2023, at William R. Mason Regional Park in Irvine, Orange County Parks park ranger Megan Matchett was notified that

a man collapsed, and his lips were turning blue. Without hesitation, she followed her training, notifying dispatch, assessing the man's condition, and quickly beginning CPR. Her fellow park rangers Derrick Ankerstar and Kevin Estrada jumped in to help. Matchett, Estrada, and Ankerstar worked as a team to provide CPR, give rescue breaths and administer an AED until the Orange County Fire Authority arrived and assumed patient care. At that time, thanks to the heroic efforts of Ankerstar, Estrada, and Matchett, the man had regained his pulse. The training, teamwork and swift actions of Ankerstar, Estrada, and Matchett undoubtedly helped save his life.

#### Olivia Clay Youth Hero

her 2-year-old cousin Paisley into the backyard. Shortly after, Paisley accidentally fell into the pool, also pulling Olivia into the water, who was trying to keep her cousin from falling in. While in the water, Olivia

quickly yelled for her family, grabbed her cousin, and maneuvered to the poolside to grab a ledge, while holding her cousin in her other arm to keep her from drowning. Olivia continued to hold onto her cousin and call for help. After hearing the cries for help, Paisley's mother jumped into the pool and helped rescue the girls along with Olivia's father, Brandin. Thanks to Olivia's incredible heroism and composure, both she and her cousin were able to survive the harrowing near-drowning experience.

#### Fairuz Schlecht Good Samaritan Hero

On the night of December 20, 2022, Fairuz Schlecht and her family were asleep in their second-floor apartment when they were awoken by the sound of smoke alarms due to a fire in her building. After they safely escaped, Fairuz noticed three children screaming from

a neighboring second-floor bedroom window with smoke coming from it. Without hesitation, she immediately ran back into the burning building, crawling on her hands and knees to a bedroom where she found all three young children, one of whom was hiding under a bed. Carrying all three children through dangerous smoke and fire, Fairuz was able to again escape to safety with all three children and reunite them with their parents.
